Obesity Increases Car Crash Fatalities

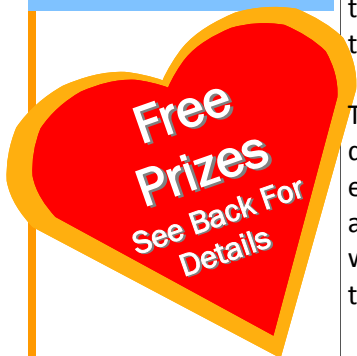

For years crash dummies have been used to simulate the effects a high speed car crash can have on the driver and increase vehicle safety.



These crash dummies have become very advanced in recent years, not only simulating the average humans

body in weight, size and structure, but also recording the way the body reacts and behaves in an accident.

The dummies record velocity, and if there were any body parts crushed, snapped or bent in the accident. This helps

place airbags and seatbelts properly to cushion the blow.

While all of these advancements are meant to help cars become safer, a recent study show these dummies may not adequately reflect the average American's body composition— making weight a significant factor in whether or not an individual survives an auto accident.

After the intense media coverage and the passing of anti texting laws you would think there would be a decrease in the number of driver's texting behind the wheel.

A study performed by the

These soft tissues tear, becoming inflamed and painful as the result. The purpose of chiropractic care and massage is to restore structural relationship and maintain integrity and

movement during the healing process. Your body wants to heal...the question is...will it heal with scar tissue or flexible, healthy connective tissue. The latter is most beneficial to your ongoing health, vitality and well-being.

Obesity Increases Car Crash Fatalities (Continued from Cover)

The study, which was published in the *American Journal of Emergency Medicine*, shows that obese drivers have a significantly higher chance of being killed in an auto accident simply because crash dummies do not represent overweight individuals. The crash dummy is built to represent a smaller, ‘average’ frame—which allows for more room between the steering column and seat than it would with an overweight person.

Dietrich Jehle, professor of emergency medicine at the University of Buffalo, and his colleagues conducted the study, which compared

accident fatalities in over 155,000 fatal auto accidents. The accidents all occurred between 2000 and 2005 and the team was able to make their conclusions based on 5 different weight categories;

- morbidly obese
- moderately obese
- slightly obese
- overweight
- normal
- underweight

Moderately obese drivers were shown to have a 21 percent higher chance of being killed in a severe auto accident and *morbidly obese* drivers had an astounding 56 percent greater chance of being killed than those of regular weight. The

study also showed underweight and regular weight drivers had a slightly higher chance of being killed than slightly overweight drivers.

Dr. Jehle mentioned a few ways to help make vehicles safer for the overweight population. He suggests that severely overweight individuals purchase bigger cars such as SUV’s which provide more room between the seat and the steering wheel, reducing injury. He also suggests that car manufacturers make a point to test cars with different dummy sizes so the entire population may be better represented and protected in an accident.

In the last month I have seen hundreds of serious auto accident cases throughout the country, but there were two that really struck a chord.

On January 5th, a teenage girl was driving in a small town in North Carolina, when she veered onto the wrong side of the road and towards the backend of a semi-truck. The semi attempted to avoid the collision by swerving off the road, but was unsuccessful- the vehicles collided.

Her car (shown on the cover page) was totaled and the 18-year-old girl was killed instantly in the collision.

Police quickly discovered the cause of the accident- a text message had been received just 1 minute before the 9-1-1 call was made reporting the accident.

A few seconds of inattention cost the life of the 18-year-old high

school student, who was set to graduate in just a few short months.

In another incident, a 19-year-old girl is facing criminally negligent homicide charges for an accident that claimed the life of a delivery driver.

53-year-old Tian Sheng Lin was stopped at a red light while delivering food for his restaurant when he was struck by an inattentive vehicle, smashing his scooter. The 19-year-old driver failed to see the scooter and plowed into it- totaling her vehicle and the scooter. Lin suffered severe head trauma and was quickly pronounced brain dead when medical aid arrived.

It was discovered that the teen driver was texting at the time of the accident. She had received a text message just two minutes before the accident, and an unfinished text remained on her phone when police

arrived at the scene. The driver suffered little injury, but Lin, a recent immigrant to the United States, was killed and left behind a wife and children who were forced to sell the family restaurant and left with little money.

These horrible accidents are the reason I started Teens Against Distracted Driving (TADD). TADD is a program created to discuss the dangers of texting while driving with teens and collect pledges to refrain from such dangerous behavior.
